

Unit **8****WORKSHEET 8D****Mail Merge**

The *mail merge* feature is a very useful integrated application that lets you create one document and send it to many people, automatically changing names and addresses whenever needed. For example, if you want to send a letter to 25 friends in your computer address book, you could use a mail merge instead of individually typing each envelope. To create a mail merge, data from a worksheet table (containing information such as e-mail addresses, fax numbers, names, or addresses) is combined with a word processing document (such as a form letter).
