## Chapter 14 Lesson 3: The Nervous System

#### Introduction:

Head and spinal cord injuries are among the most serious kinds of damage the human body can experience. You may be at risk for this potentially debilitating type of injury when you engage in sports that involve a risk of falls or collisions, such as rock climbing, football, or bicycling. Fortunately, you can protect yourself by wearing a suitable helmet whenever you take part in these types of sports. This fact sheet developed by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHSTA) provides more information about bicycle helmets and the protection they provide.

#### Answers:

- 1. 85 to 88 percent effective
- 2. Only about 20 to 25 percent
- 3. In California in 1986 (effective in 1987)
- 4. By preventing injuries that are expensive to treat
- 5. 20 states plus the District of Columbia
