Review Key Concepts

1. Parenting is giving the appropriate care, guidance, and support to help a child develop to his or her potential.
2. Use a properly-installed safety seat in the car. Be vigilant at parks or pools. Ensure playgrounds have well-maintained equipment. Teach older toddlers about stranger danger.
3. CPR should be performed only by someone who is properly trained.
4. With in-home child care, a caregiver cares for one child in that child's home. With family child care, children are cared for in the caregiver's home.

5. Different books may offer slightly different techniques for the skills.

Review Key Concepts

1. A child needs to learn to make friends, get along with others, and express his or her feelings in socially acceptable ways. A caregiver should offer opportunities for the child to play with other children and by offering guidance.
2. Redirect behavior, give reminders, remove the child from the situation, make the punishment appropriate, and enforce the consequences.
3. Three types of play include quiet and active play, small- and large-group play, scheduled activities, and free play.
