- 1. List three known benefits of having a Big Brother or Big Sister.
- 2. How old are the children who receive mentoring through Big Brothers Big Sisters?
- 3. Describe the two main forms of mentoring offered by Big Brothers Big Sisters.
- 4. Describe the process of becoming a Big Brother or Big Sister.
- 5. List three examples cited on the Web site of activities Bigs and Littles might share.
- 6. How much of every dollar donated to Big Brothers Big Sisters goes to directly to making and supporting matches?

Answers:

- Any three: Little Brothers and Little Sisters are more confident in their schoolwork performance, 52 percent less likely to skip school, 46 percent less likely to begin using illegal drugs, 27% less likely to begin using alcohol, and more likely to get along with families and peers.
- 2. Ages 6 to 18
- 3. In community-based mentoring, the Big and Little meet for as little as an hour per week to share activities in the community. In school-based mentoring, Bigs and Littles meet once a week in schools, libraries, or community centers.
- 4. After expressing an interest in volunteering, applicants must go through a thorough background check and interview process. Then Bigs and Littles are matched based on location, personality, and preference.

- 5. Any three: shooting hoops, playing a board game, sharing a pizza, taking a walk in the park, or just hanging out and talking
- 6. 92.2 cents
